The meeting was called to order by President Van Scyoc at 2:03 PM. The meeting was properly noticed, and a quorum was present.

The Pledge of Allegiance to the United States of America was said.

- Director Orchard moved the Board to approve the BOD Meeting Minutes for November 13, 2025, and the Motion was 2nd by Director Traverso. Motion Approved with Gwen Grace abstained.

President's Update: Andy Van Scyoc

President Van Scyoc stated he would like to have Committee Confirmations at the January BOD meeting and would like to appoint a committee to review. President Van Scyoc asked Director Harvey, Director Besase and Director Grace to partake on the committee to Review Charters of each Committee.

Treasurer's Report: Director Besase

Director Besase provided a written report attached to these minutes. Also announced the start of the Administration office addition as begun. After Director Besase presented his report to the Board of Directors, Director Kelly questioned asking what is contributing to the 6000-line items. Is it a timing issue or is it over budget? Director Besase explained that there are sixteen-line items, and there are three major ones that are over on expenses: where were legal, bad debt expense and insurance expense which made it \$82,000.00 but, the 7000-line items series is under \$120,000.00. Director Kelly thanked Director Besase for his response for clarifying the attributing specific number.

Manager's Report: Manager Hedges, provided the Board with an update on the projects that staff have been working on. As the grass mowing is slowing down a little bit for the season RWA has been mowing some of the unapproved vacant lots and Canal bank mowing. We have done extensive amount of work in the Maintenance Barn cleaning the whole area and some parking was added behind the maintenance building to move the trucks and equipment. RWA is getting into the wintertime project of painting the maintenance floors. The addition to the Administration Building has started, which is great.

Deed Restrictions Violations: Kelsey Stewart, Administrator

Ms. Stewart stated that there are violations listed in the Board Packet for approval. A motion to levy fines on members for violations listed numbers 1 through 58. If confirmed by the Compliance Committee, these fines shall be automatically imposed.

- Director Harvey made a motion to approve the Deed Restriction Violations and Director Orchard 2nd the Motion. Motion Unanimously Approved

Director Orchard provided a written report attached to these minutes.

Director Orchard state that this will be her last report as chairman, there will be a new chairman coming in 2026. Bingo has been canceled for December. Happy Hour will be moving to the Community Center starting in January they would like to have food trucks for this event. It's a motion that's in the packet that we have been talking about which is new. All the members of the COC Committee have agreed to return next year except Chrissy Royce sent an email withdrawing from the committee. COC would like to motion for food trucks at our Mix and Mingle event in January of 2026 for a trial run. Our Warranty Deed specifically says that RWA cannot have regular sale of food and beverage for either a restaurant, food truck or other permanent facility. President Van Scyoc asked Director Kelly to confirm for meeting minutes. Director Kelly responded yes, I agreed to do the first and then see how it goes. This should not be a "blanket" approval, every single one on every single month. Director Harvey questioned Director Kelly on what they should do on an ongoing basis. Do

they consult you as they are wanting to hold the event. Director Kelly responded that yeah this is a sample trial for the first month.

- Director Orchard motioned to permit Mix and Mingle happy hour to bring in food trucks to the Community Center Parking lot for the gathering on a trial basis. It will be the first Wednesday in January at the Community Center parking lot. It would be limited to the trial run and then be reassessed and discussed among the Board of Directors. Director Harvey seconded the motion. Passed by Directors with Director Kelly abstained.

Director Harvey questioned the BOD if a date was set for Gazabo Island Statue dedication. Director Orchard replied, "no until the statue is there" it is out for a facelift. Director Besase replied that they can come up with a day in the next week, but he thinks it should be the second or third week of January for the Statue of Liberty dedication, it just must be narrowed down. Manager Hedges questioned if the dedication would be in January and President Van Scyoc responded that what they would like to have it in January. Director Orchard asked Director Grace if she could obtain a proclamation. Director Gace replied she will start working on the proclamation for the dedication ceremony for the Statue of Liberty. Director Besase asked what is the proclamation? Director Grace replied that they would like to have Charlotte County do a proclamation of Liberty Island where the Statue of Liberty will reside.

Director Traverso I have information for the Board about the several abandoned homes where builder have decided not to finish or have gotten into economic difficulties which is an eyesore for Rotonda West. Manager Hedges is working diligently to go after the people responsible. It is an extremely complicated process requiring hiring a second attorney that is a foreclosure expert. The positive note is in the last six months we have had two builders that bought an abandoned home site and will finish it off with the original plans. In terms of new application in Rotonda West for new construction in the last six months there have not been many. There had been a lack of new construction applications, while still clearing the inventory of existing homes under construction that are taking over a year to build, and the abandoned home and the maximum fine imposed reaches \$5,000.00 then proceeding to foreclosure starts which is extremely difficult. He stated if anyone has questions feel free to contact Director Traverso. Also, he commended Dale Jensen and the Election Committee for getting secret ballots up and running. "It was no easy endeavor; it took a long time to Chair Jensen and his committee hats off thank you."

Director Grace first thanked everyone who voted for her. She stated she hopes she brings something solid to the board working together. Merry Christmas and Happy Holidays.

Director Orchard stated that she wanted to thank the Community Outreach Committee, it has been a good five years, working with a lot of members. She appreciated those who were going to stay on and do good for next year. Also, thank you to Dale Jensen for his time on Deed Restriction Committee.

Director Kelly questioned what happened to the appeal on the agenda, did it go away? President Van Scyoc stated that the member could not make it today and it will be on January 2026 agenda. Director Kelly wished everyone a Merry Christmas.

Director Harvey thanked Chair Jensen for his contribution and his staff for the electronic voting, which I did have my reservation on how it would work it worked out greatly.

Director Besase responded to Director Traverso statement that some of the construction companies go out of business and can't be found. Some people ask "why can't there be a surety bond. So if you are building a \$400,000.00 home and you put up that amount, in four month if progress was made then reduced to \$300,000.00 and then if more work is done then reduced to \$200,000.00 and after four more months it is reduced to \$200,000.00 and then when given a completion then reduced to \$0 and are given certificate of occupancy, then the surety bond goes away.

President Van Scyoc thanked the staff, thanked all the committee members of RWA and thanked his fellow Directors expressing that RWA had a good year and hopefully another good year in 2026.

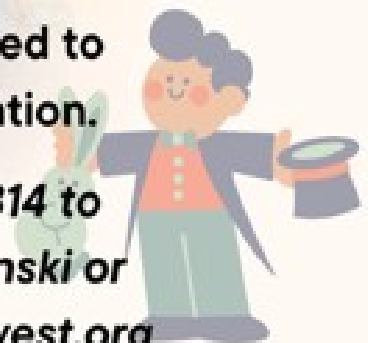

CHARLOTTE COUNTY NEWS ITEMS – FEBRUARY 2026

- The RW S&D MSBU unanimous motion to MILL & GRIND Rotonda Circle been REJECTED by the Charlotte County Commissioners.
- PAVING - Rotonda West PAVING began on MONDAY July 21, 2025. \$17 million
- PAVING (except for punch list items) is completed for all sections except Oakland Hills & Indian Road and Rotonda Circle and Boundary; each section took about 4-6 weeks.
- MSBU PAVING – BY RWA SECTIONS: AJAX PAVING – VENICE OFFICE
- PROJECTED PAVING SCHEDULE–Subject to weather & equipment & manpower delays/ issues
- OAKLAND HILLS SHOULD CONCLUDE BY THE END OF FEBRUARY EXCEPT FOR PUNCH LIST ITEMS
- INDIAN ROAD AROUND AMERICAN LEGION SHOULD START IN FEBRUARY 2026
- BOUNDARY FROM RB NORTH TO CAPE HAZE RECLAMATION PAVING IN FEBRUARY 2026
- Multiple sewer & water issues not to correct depth (36 inches vs 11 inches) causing delays
- ROTONDA CIRCLE FROM REBEL CT TO RB WEST RECLAMATION PAVING START FEBRUARY 2026
- ROTONDA CIRCLE FROM RB EAST TO RB SOUTH OVERLAY PAVING START IN FEBRUARY 2026
- PAVING IN ROTONDA SCHEDULED THRU APRIL 2026
- PUNCH LIST FOR ALL SECTIONS–SUCH AS REPLACE & WATER SOD/MANHOLE COVERS, DRIVEWAY ISSUES, ETC ABOUT 8 WEEKS BEHIND ACTUAL STREET PAVING
- Future issues of WEST WAYS shall include the projected start/finish for the remaining RWA sections.
- Charlotte County Paving Project Manager is James Layport and his phone number is: 941-628-8084
- PERHAPS 45-DAY Paving schedule slips due to Weather & Equipment & Manpower issues.
- *ROTONDA BRIDGE #13 – ROTONDA BLVD SOUTH – UPDATE:
 - I wrote all of the Charlotte County Commissioners as well as the County Administrator and the County Director of Public Works and Congressman Steube. Special MSBU meeting held in January, some slight progress with FEMA, there have been 2 FEMA/CC ZOOM meetings.
 - UPDATE: As of January 27, 2026, still no Army Corps of Engineer permit.
 - The bridge build bid specification is ready, waiting on the ACOE permit.
 - If you have any other concerns or questions, please reach out.
 - *Bridge construction start perhaps 2Q-3Q 2026, completion expected 10-12 months later 1Q 2027?
 - Traffic lights at Gasparilla & Rotonda Boulevard East NOW scheduled for installation - 2Q 2026.
 - Traffic lights at Gasparilla & Ingram/Ingraham are also to be installed in the 2Q 2026.
 - Remaining 4 bridges, (#110-#111-#112-#123) are scheduled for summer/fall of 2026.
 - *US Government shutdown(43 days) may affect completion of these items!!!

“DROWNING IN STUFF”

An Organized Drawer

It's that time of the year again. Time to clear out the excesses of the holiday season and get our home organized. At a January Community Outreach Presentation, *Drowning in Stuff*, presenter Ali Tedeschi showed us how to keep that New Year's resolution to get organized and to stay that way.

Ali Tedeschi, a professional home organizer, opened the program by sharing a few statistics.

- The average American home holds more than 300,000 items
- In the United States there are over 52,000 storage buildings
- United States has 90% of the storage inventory worldwide

Over consumption has grown since the end of WWII due to many factors such as an excess of disposable money, cheaper products made of plastics from other countries, big-box stores, credit card use, and now incredibly easy on-line shopping.

We tend to keep too many items for what we feel are legitimate reasons, such as that we believe we will need that item someday, or that the item is worth a lot of money, or it's a family heirloom, or our favorite (and often incorrect) belief that our children will want it.

Ali states the goal of organizing your home is to create efficiencies which will save you time and money. We often spend a great deal of time searching for items, and sometimes even buy the item again because we can't find it or have forgotten that we own it. Another benefit of living in an organized home is the pride in an organized home, and the reduction of the stress that comes from living in a disorganized one.

Home organizing can be overwhelming. Ali suggests starting small with a drawer or closet. Keep in mind how much your home can hold, and who you share a home with. Different members of the family will have different comfort levels when it comes to getting rid of items.

Ali explained that there are 4 basic steps to getting organized:

1. Remove and Sort (empty targeted area to create a clean slate)
2. Declutter and Purge (time to make hard decisions. Sort into piles of “keep, sell, donate, or discard”)
3. Restore (decide where the item will live. Keep most-used items in a convenient area or in the forefront of a drawer or cabinet)
4. Maintain (Most important step! Give more thought to your purchasing habits)

Remember: The ultimate goal of being organized is to create space. Good luck!

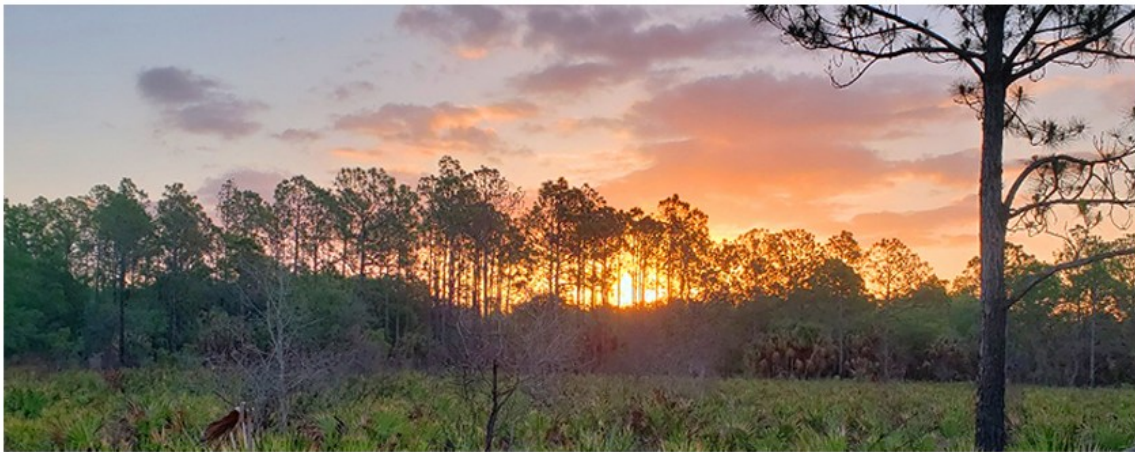

GARDEN TIP FOR FEBRUARY

Q: When is the best time to plant a tree? A: 20 years ago (Old landscaper's joke)

In southwest Florida, any time is a good time to plant a tree. If you desire shade for your yard, you might seek a fast grower, such as the showstopper, the royal poinciana (*DeLonix regia*). Its fiery red-orange flowers will be sensational someday but its root system is superficial and its branches are prone to breakage.

Native trees often have the best wind resistance; a less familiar native tree, Sugarberry (*Celtis laevigata*), is excellent for shade, and is also a fast grower. With interesting knobby bark, this tree has edible berries. The Sugarberry loses its leaves (**deciduous**), as does the Sweetgum, both native and fast growing. Sweetgum (*Liquidambar styraciflua*) offers red or orange fall color, rare in our zone. Red maple (*Acer rubrum*) with stunning fall color is another popular native. All three offer medium wind resistance, important in our area.

Want **evergreen** leaves and blossoms? Little Gem Magnolia (*Magnolia grandiflora* 'Little Gem') produces lush, fragrant white blossoms. It reaches a height of 25 feet, much less than our native magnolias, perfect for a small yard. Dahoon holly (*Ilex cassine*), a native holly, has green shiny leaves, is drought resistant, and has good wind tolerance. It has flowers and berries the birds will love; you need a male tree nearby to produce fruit on the female. The sand live oak (*Quercus geminata*) reaches 20-50 feet tall and is less wide than our giant live oaks. It has high wind resistance, is drought tolerant and offers food for wildlife. A beautiful pine is the native Longleaf (*Pinus palustris*), which can live up to 300 years. Its needles grow to 18" long and it supports numerous birds.

Our dry season is a fine time to plant a tree. Short days and cool temperatures help trees adjust to their new home, but be diligent about watering: every day for 2 weeks, every other day for the next 2 weeks, then twice a week for the first year. After that, native trees may rely on rain, but be sure to water during extensive dry periods.

Learn more about your tree choices on line. Soil requirements, sun exposure, height and width at maturity, planting tips, water requirements, and fertilizer needs (for non natives), and even what pests or diseases to watch for are easy to find on the internet. Use the scientific name as well as the common name for your search. Wind resistance and salt tolerance are important considerations as the future may hold more frequent storms.

Yards can be designed and managed for both wildlife and humans. Sara Weber presented tips for making yards wildlife friendly and help preserve the natural environment.



Limit the Amount of Lawn

Native plants offer food, shelter, and safety for birds, insects and other wildlife. Include trees, shrubs, and flowers in your garden. Diverse plants provide food sources like seeds, berries, and nectar. They also offer shelter and nesting spots. Choose plants that bloom at different times of the year to ensure food is available during all seasons. Add a birdbath or small pond near your plants. Keep the water clean and change it often. Do not use pesticides or chemicals in your garden which harm birds and the insects they eat. Choose natural ways to control pests.

A full house, over 70 people, attended the presentation on Share the Shore with Shorebirds. Mary Lundeborg illustrated her talk with her beautiful photographs and provided information about these state designated threatened beach nesting birds such as Least Terns, Snowy Plovers and Black Skimmers. Other shorebirds such as Semi-palmated Plovers, Ruddy Turnstones and Sanderlings nest in the Arctic and are snow-birds, wintering in Florida and need to feed and rest while here.

Challenges include habitat destruction, pollution, pesticides, predators and disturbances from people and dogs. She talked about the decline in the bird population and how we can help. Even what we plant in our yards can make a difference, by planting native plants that need less water and no fertilizer we can reduce runoff, pesticide pollution. We can eliminate single-use plastic that ends up on our shores. We can keep dogs off beaches where nesting birds are present since birds see them as predators and will leave their nests. Chasing and disturbing birds saps their energy when they need to feed and rest. We can all do our part to make a better place for shorebirds.

Everyone wants to enjoy the beach but we can share the shore with shorebirds!

Thank you for taking a few minutes to read this important article about our Neighborhood Watch and, more importantly, about the need for volunteers.

Neighborhood Watch is not law enforcement; we assist the Sheriff's office by being an extra set of eyes and ears. We don't intervene, we don't confront, and we don't put ourselves in danger. What we do is simple but powerful: we stay alert, we observe our surroundings, and we report suspicious or unusual activity to the proper authorities. That alone makes a real difference.

One of the strongest deterrents to crime is presence. When people know that neighbors are paying attention, problems often don't start in the first place. Our patrols help keep an eye on our streets, (Boundary Blvd. to Parade Circle and all streets in between) check on county property, and provide extra awareness during hours when most people are settling in for the night. It's about neighbors looking out for neighbors.

Right now, we need more volunteers. Over time, things change. Volunteers move away. Some can no longer drive. And sadly, some of our longtime members have passed on. These are natural parts of life—but the result is the same: fewer people are left to carry the responsibility of watching over our neighborhood.

You don't need special skills, experience, or a lot of free time. Training is provided, patrol areas are clearly defined, and you only patrol in the area you live in. You choose what works for your schedule. Some volunteers patrol regularly, and snowbirds volunteer when they are here—and all of it matters.

Volunteering does **not** have to mean driving the roads. We have several unique opportunities for those who prefer not to patrol. These include **Area Patrol Coordinator**, who help organize and support patrol activity, and **Base Station Personnel**, who assist from home by monitoring communications and supporting patrols. These roles are just as important and make patrolling possible. Cont'd on next page

- **Boating Law** – Boat registration, hull identification numbers, regulations, required safety equipment, federal boating law, state boating law, and accident reporting.
- **Safety Equipment** – Life jackets, fire extinguishers, sound-producing devices, visual distress signals, anchors, and other safety equipment.
- **Safe Operation and Navigation** – Buoys and beacons, aids to navigation, navigational rules, docking, and the dangers of alcohol use.
- **Boating Emergencies** – Boating accidents, man overboard, capsizing, hypothermia, emergency radio use, carbon monoxide peril, and weather.
- **Trailer** – Types of trailers, lights, hitches, and towing a trailer.
- **Sports and Boating** – Water-skiing, hunting and hunting gear, PWC (Personal Watercraft) operation, and other boating tips.

Upon successful completion of a multiple-choice test at the end of the course, you will earn a Florida Boating Safety Education virtual ID Card. In addition, you may qualify for a substantial discount on your boat insurance. **Check with your insurance agent.**
